

Masculine Get Well Card



Supplies

- Wanted to Say Dies
- Earthen Elegance Designer Series Papers
- Copper Clay Card Stock
- Copper Clay 3/8" (1cm) Textured Ribbon
- Basic White card stock (card liner)
- Adhesive Sheets (optional)
- Multi-Purpose Liquid Glue

Directions

- Cut card stock to 14.9cm x 21cm (8-1/2" x 5-1/2"). Score the card stock at 10.5cm (4-1/4") center and fold the card base in half.
- Cut a strip of the Pretty Peacock patterned paper to 14.3cm x 3.5cm. (5-1/2" x 1-1/2")
- Cut a strip of the drip patterned paper to 14.3cm x 6.5cm. (5-1/2" x 2-3/4")
- Glue down the Pretty Peacock piece of paper to the left side of the card leaving a border of .5cm (1/4") on three sides. Place the drip patterned paper flush next to the Pretty Peacock piece, doing this should leave a border of .5cm (1/4") on the remaining three sides.

Masculine Get Well Card cont. 2.

- Cut the ribbon to approximately 40cm (16") and tie around the card front covering the seam between the two papers. The ribbon in the example is tied with a basic square knot. Trim the ends.
- Cut a scrap of the Pretty Peacock patterned paper and a scrap of the Copper Clay card stock to approximately 10cm x 6cm (4" x 2-12") If using the adhesive sheet affix each piece to one side of the sheet. Die cut the words Feel Better Soon from the Copper Clay piece and the background for the words from the Pretty Peacock piece.
- Affix the words to the background and then glue the completed sentiment to the drip patterned section of the card, centering it top and bottom and side to side within the drip patterned paper section.
- If using the Basic white card liner, cut the liner to 10cm x 14.3cm (4" x 5-1/4") and glue to the inside of the card.

Note: The Adhesive Paper is not necessary but highly recommended. This 'paper' is like a giant sheet of double sided tape and can easily be die cut once affixed to card stock or patterned paper. Sometimes trying to glue light or thin die cuts can be tedious and messy; the Adhesive sheet(s) is easy, just peel off the backing after the die cut is made. Do be aware, these sheets are VERY sticky. I used tweezers to hold the delicate die cut after peeling off the backing. This helped prevent the die cut from sticking to my fingers and tearing. Alternatively you can use strips of double sided tape or Stampin'Up's Tear & Tape placed close together to get a similar effect.
